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## **Cambodia**

### **Storms damaged houses in Cambodia.**

On 14 June 2025, heavy rains and strong winds swept across parts of Cambodia, causing damage in Battambang province. A total of five houses were destroyed in the Kear and Kaeng Mongkol communes of Moug Russey district. However, no injuries or fatalities were reported as a result of the storms.

## **Indonesia**

**Heavy rains triggered flooding in Indonesia.** Several provinces in Indonesia, including Central Java, East Java, Central Sulawesi, and South Kalimantan, experienced days of heavy rainfall and overflowing rivers. As of 11 June 2025, more than 27,00 people were affected in Central and East Java. Meanwhile, 6,971 houses, 29 schools, 730 hectares of land, and 30 roads were inundated. In response, authorities issued extreme weather warnings across much of the country.

## **Philippines**

### **Severe flooding in the Philippines caused fatalities and displacement.**

Heavy rainfall affected the northern and southern parts of the Philippines, particularly in southern Luzon, and northern Mindanao, causing widespread flooding. As of 11 June 2025, one person was injured, 85 were evacuated, and 1,300 were affected. Additionally, 52 families in the Metro Manila area were forced to evacuate. Infrastructure was also reportedly damaged. The Philippines continued to experience severe weather and floods. As of 12 June 2025, three people were killed in Mindanao, and another was injured in Luzon. Also, 17,516 people were affected, and nearly 1,500 were displaced.

## **Viet Nam**

### **Typhoon Wutip claimed lives in Viet Nam.**

Since 11 June 2025, Typhoon Wutip had brought heavy rains and severe flooding to central Viet Nam. The storm killed nine people while two others were reported missing. More than 3,500 homes and about 88,000 hectares of crops were submerged. The typhoon also caused delays and cancellations of over 20 flights at Da Nang Airport on 12 June 2025. Typhoon Wutip later weakened into a tropical depression on 14 June 2025.

## China

**Typhoon Wutip prompted a mass evacuation in South China.** Southern Chinese provincial regions activated emergency response measures on the morning of 13 June 2025 as Typhoon Wutip, the first typhoon of the year, approached. About 26,635 people in Hainan province were evacuated as a precaution. Nearly 80,000 fishing boats in Guangdong and Hainan provinces were ordered to return to port or seek shelter with over 50,000 crew members brought ashore for safety. In Sanya city, all kindergartens, schools, construction sites, and tourist attractions were temporarily closed, and sailing was prohibited. Sanya Airport suspended all flights and high-speed rail services across Hainan were halted. Typhoon Wutip later made landfall near Dongfang city in Hainan at around 11 p.m. on 13 June 2025 and moved near Leizhou city in Guangdong at around 12:30 a.m. on 14 June 2025. It was expected to move northeast but its intensity weakened to a severe tropical storm.
