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## Indonesia

### **Landslides displaced thousands of residents in Indonesia.**

As of 12 February 2026, a total of 575 families, or 2,461 people, have evacuated to temporary shelters following the landslides caused by a week-long period rainfall in Padasari Village, Jatinegara District, Tegal Regency, Central Java, Indonesia on 2 February 2026. The disaster affected 863 houses, which 413 were severely damaged, 189 were moderately damaged, and 97 were slightly damaged. Several public facilities were also damaged, including seven schools, seven places of worship, 21 social facilities, and one government office. In addition, irrigation dams, roads, and bridges were affected.

## Malaysia

### **Torrential rainfall forced evacuation in Malaysia.**

As of 13 February 2026, the number of evacuees caused by heavy rain in Sabah, Malaysia since 10 February 2026 to up to 355 people from 149 families. They sheltered in three temporally relief centres.

In Beaufort, 242 affected individuals from 89 families from three villages were sheltered at the Selagon PPS, an increase from 154 people from 53 families on 12 February 2026. In Sipitang, 95 people from 45 families were housed at the Dewan Sekolah Kebangsaan Padang Berampah PPS, while 108 people from 51 families remained at the Dewan Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Padang Berampah.

## Philippines

### **Volcanic ash from Kanlaon Volcano affected nearby resident in the Philippines.**

On 13 February 2026, Kanlaon Volcano emitted ash, affecting 31 barangays in La Castellana and Pontevedra towns, as well as Bago City and La Carlota City, in Negros Occidental, the Philippines. The ash plume rose 300 meters above the crater and drifted southwest. The Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology reported that 14 volcanic earthquakes were also detected around Kanlaon Volcano. The alert level remained at Level 2 since July 2025. Authorities prohibited entry into the four-kilometer-radius danger zone and restricted flights near the volcano.

## Thailand

### **Several earthquakes struck in Thailand.**

There were nine mild earthquakes, ranging from 1.9 to 3.2 on the Richter scale, jolting Tambon Khao Phang in Bang Ta Khun District, Surat Thani Province, southern Thailand, between 11 and 12 February 2026. The strongest earthquake, measuring 3.2 on the Richter scale, occurred at a depth of 2 kilometers and was classified as a minor event. No damage or

injuries were reported. Later, on 16 February 2026, a magnitude 3.3 earthquake occurred in Ban Dai Subdistrict, Mae Sai District, Chiang Rai Province, in the northern part of the country, at a depth of 3 kilometers. The earthquake was caused by movement along the Mae Chan Fault. Residents in several subdistricts of Chiang Rai felt the tremor.
