Thailand

Thai rates rose due to the delivery of shipment and demand from regular customers.

Thailand's 5 percent broken rice prices slightly increased to 510 USD per tonne from 500 USD per tonne a week earlier after shipments were exported and active demand from regular customers. Moreover, prices could go up a bit more, but markets will become more competitive after India resumes more exports.

Viet Nam

Prices for Vietnamese rice prices are stable while imposing 5 percent tax on fertiliser in July 2025.

According to the Vietnam Food Association, rates of Vietnamese 5 percent broken rice were remained at 520 USD per tonne from a week ago. However, traders offered the lower prices, ranging from 500- 510 USD per tonne. Sales are slow because buyers and sellers are not happy with the current prices, a Ho Chi Minh-based trader said. Meanwhile, a tax rate of 5 percent will be imposed on fertiliser from July 2025. This approval would make domestic rice less competitive in the international market.

Japan

Japan donates 300 tonnes of rice to support the Philippines.

Japan has donated 300 tonnes of rice to beneficiaries in Leyte province. The victims were affected by the Severe Tropical Storm Kristine and El Nino Phenomenon under the ASEAN Plus Three Emergency Rice Reserve (APTERR) framework. Kristine was among the strongest to hit and significantly affect the Eastern Visayas region.
